
Here is what Harrison had to say:

Fire Marshals in Year 1 and Year 2

For the last half term, Year 1 and 2 have been Fire Marshals.

To begin with, we drew some Tudor houses using charcoal and heard the story of the Great Fire of London. Next, we met Thomas Farriner who had been blamed for the fire. People thought he'd set it on purpose because it started in his bakery. After our trial, he was a free man because it was not his fault that the fire was so bad—he was just a baker and it was a mistake.

Then we became Londoners and chose some businesses, like blacksmiths, seamstresses, builders, bakeries and a fishmonger. We put our businesses on a map of London where the fire had destroyed London. We made signs for our shops.

One day, King Charles told us to be fire marshals to be ready to put out fires. He was worried there would be another fire. We practised putting out fires by being a bucket brigade. Dexter (the fishmonger) had the idea to use shells as horns, so that when anyone saw a fire they could sound the horn.

A few days later, everyone was busy in London when suddenly someone smelt smoke! The fire marshals all blew their horns and ran to the fire to put it out. The bucket brigade helped because everyone was a lot faster this time, even though some people spilt the water. King Charles asked us to find out what caused the fire and we discovered it was a person. However, they didn't mean to do it. It was a homeless person who had been sheltering in the shop door - he had fallen asleep and his candle had fallen over. The police met him and discovered he was homeless because of the Great Fire of London. Following this, the fire marshals decided to help by rebuilding London. We designed some new streets with houses made of bricks and stone.

After that we met Samuel Pepys who had buried his wine, cheese and diary during the fire. We decided to bury some things to help people to know about the Fire Marshals; we included pictures of us, some diaries, some pictures of equipment and our map of London.

We have enjoyed this so much that we don't want to stop learning about it.

Foundation Stage Spring time Learning









The children wanted to plant vegetables. They dug over the plot and added compost. We discussed the reason we use compost and the children were keen to explain that worms pooh compost and that is why they are so useful to the garden, as they had learnt this in Forest School.

We showed the children the seeds. they were very interested in how small they were, and the variety of shapes they came in. We demonstrated how to make a furrow and the children sprinkled the seeds in and gently pushed the soil back over the seeds, marking their position with a well chosen stick. They then came and sounded out the the names of the vegetables and wrote the name to create a sign. Theo sounded out carot and beetroot. Morgan sounded out califlaw and Jonny sounded out unyns. This was very good sounding out. Their cursive writing was great!

We showed them the laminator and explained it would melt the soft plastic which would seal in their super signs and then cool to a hard plastic that would keep out the rain. The children were very interested in how it worked and enjoyed feeding the sheets in and watching them come out set and sealed. They finally attached them to the stick and gave the vegetables a good watering, explaining that the seeds won't grow into vegetables without water.

Later that day, a group of children wanted to plant some salad vegetables. The raised bed was full so it was sug-

gested we use a couple of tyres. The children thought that was funny but were kind enough to humour their teachers. They carried the compost over and filled the tyres with compost. They then realised they had 4 different types of lettuce seeds so we split the bed into 4. We explained we call these quarters. We poured the seeds into their hands and the children sprinkled them into the segments of the bed. They then put tomato seeds into the other tyre bed. They sounded out the words lettuce and tomatoes and all made super signs and decorated them with illustrations. We then used the laminator. The children were very interested and used it safely. They proudly erected their signs! We can't wait to harvest and eat the wonderful produce.















Maths by Dylan, Harrison and Maggie




Designs for new streets in London after The Great Fire of London
